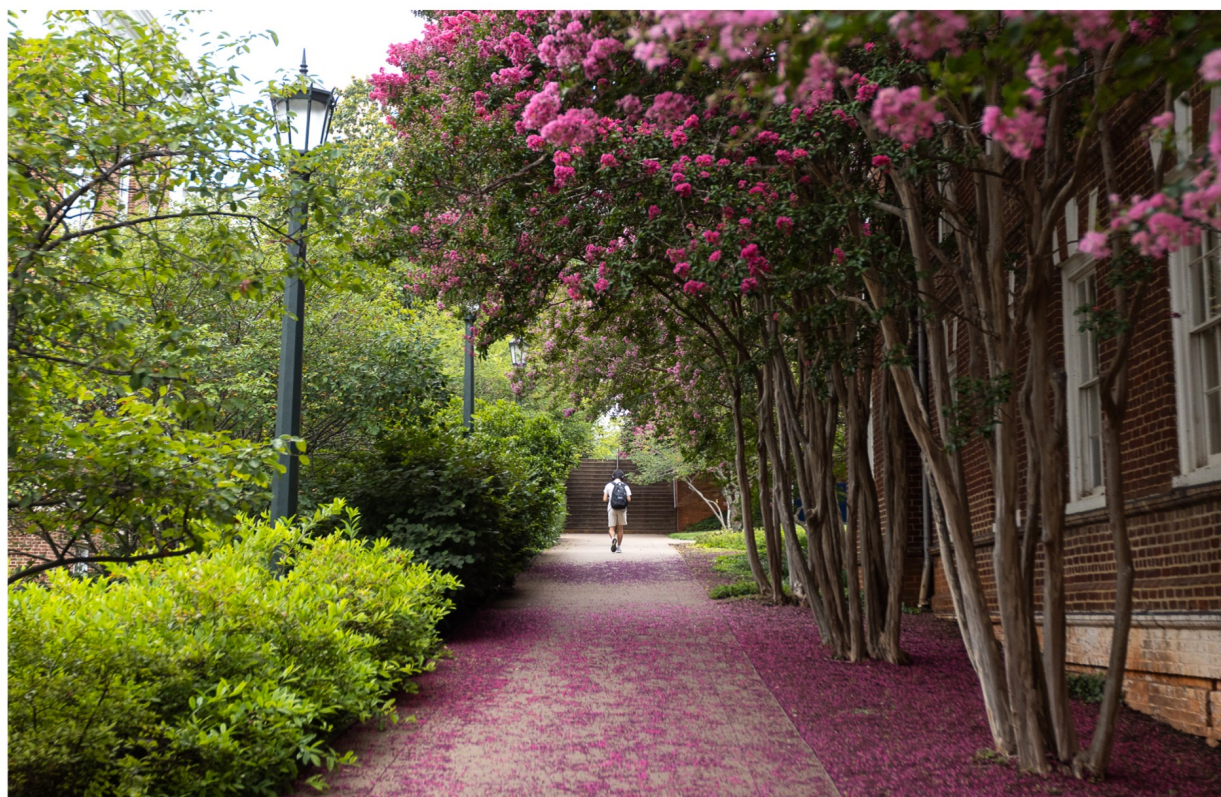

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# About SSAP

The office of Summer and Special Academic Programs (SSAP) manages the undergraduate academic and non-academic programming and services offered through UVA's [Summer Session](#) and [January Term](#), the Center for American English Language and Culture ([CAELC](#)), and a number of special programs including [UVA Advance](#), the Summer Language Institute ([SLI](#)), and UVA's [Peace Corps Prep](#) program. SSAP is also responsible for enrollment of visiting international students and exchange students as well course management and student records for UVA Education Abroad.

From the fall of 2022 through the summer of 2023, over 7,000 students were part of an SSAP administered program or tapped SSAP services. SSAP worked with over 300 faculty in 2022-2023. SSAP staff collaborate with colleagues in the International Studies Office, Student Financial Services, ITS, UREG, Student Health and Wellness, Student Safety and Support, Housing & Residence Life, Dining Services, IM-Rec Sports, the Bookstore, UVA Libraries, Facilities Management, and UVA Police.

Summer and Special Academic Programs is funded through the Office of the Executive Vice President and Provost. The Director of SSAP reports to the Vice Provost for Academic Affairs.

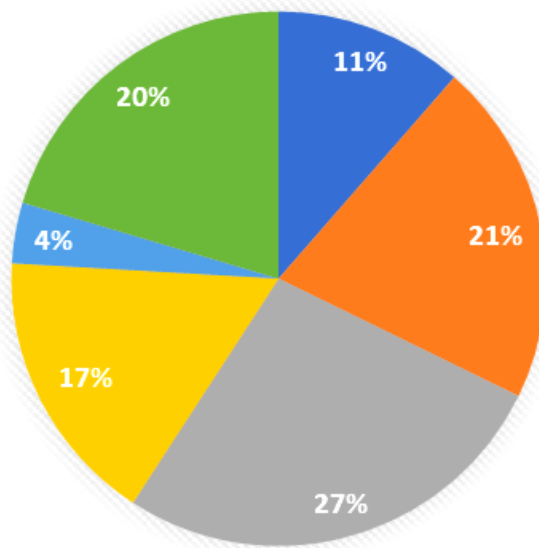

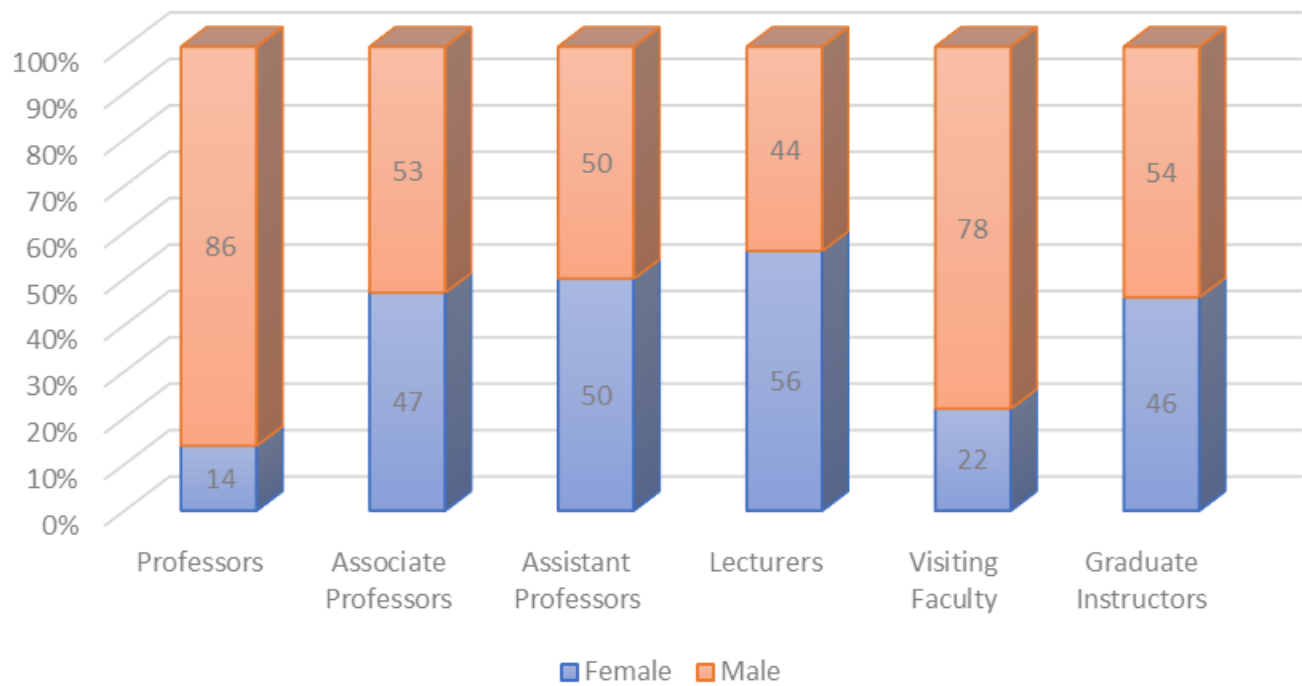

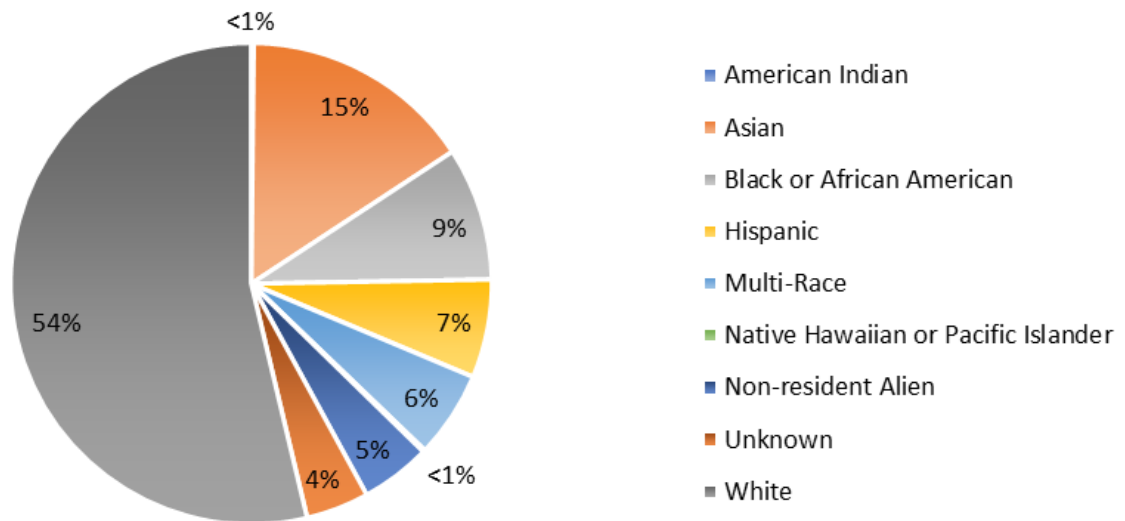

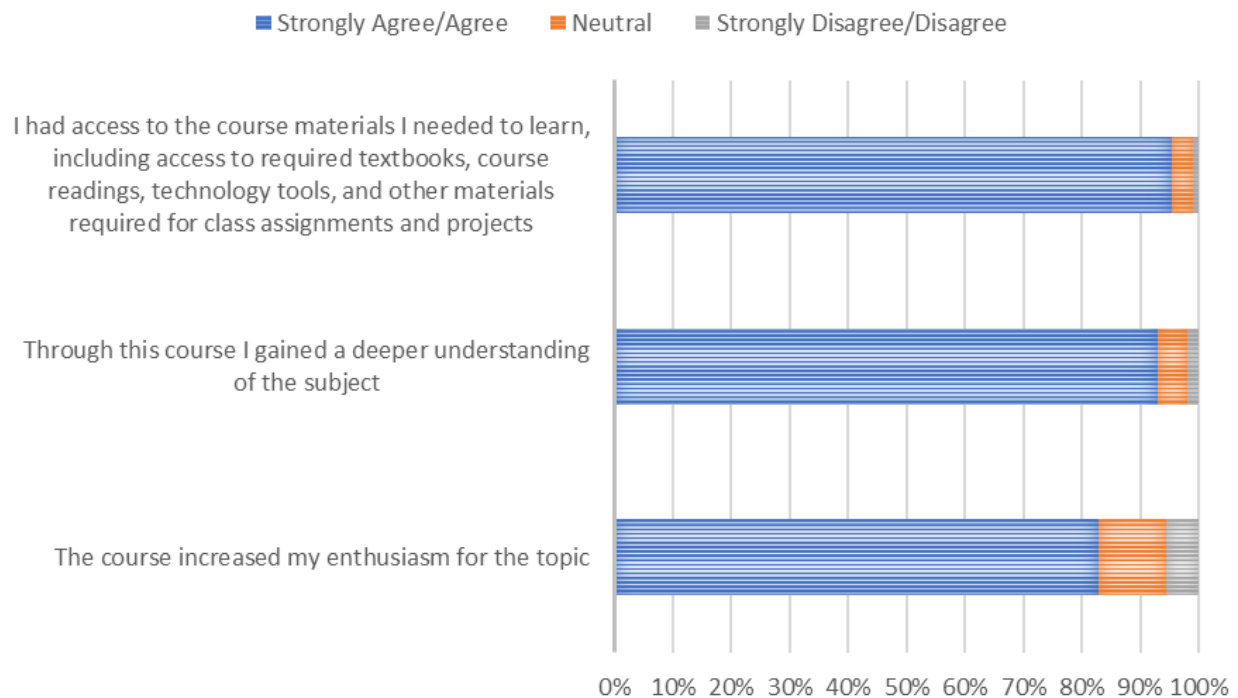

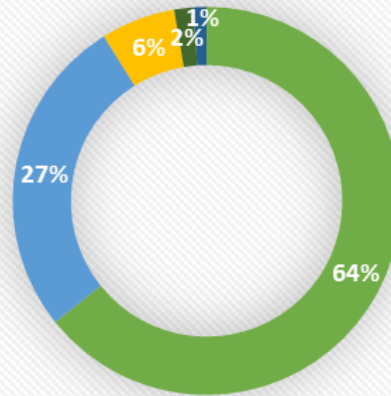

## AVERAGE NUMBER OF HOURS (PER WEEK) SPENT OUTSIDE OF CLASS PREPARING:



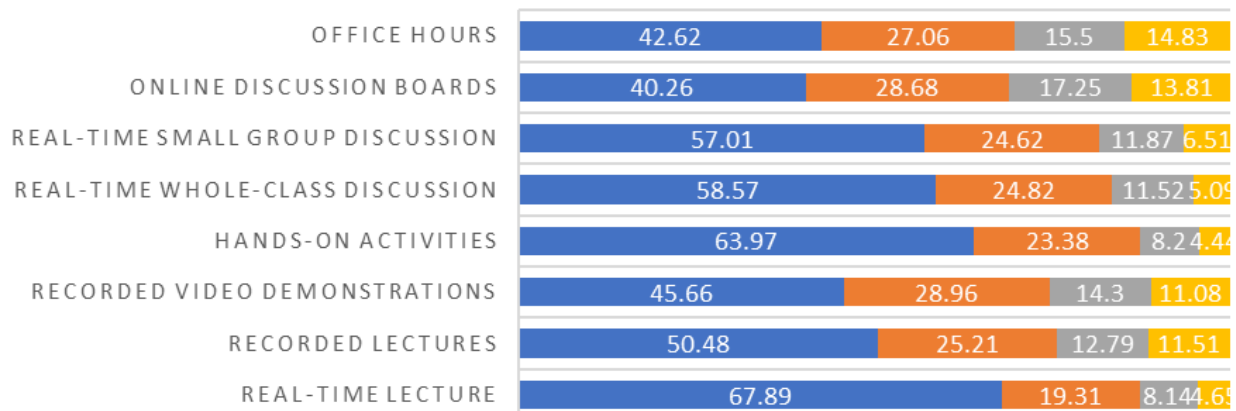
## Overall, the instructor was an effective teacher

# Special Programs





# UVA Advance

Summer Session III included UVA Advance, a four-week summer residential program for highly motivated, rising high school juniors and seniors that offers participants an opportunity to experience college life at the University of Virginia. Students enrolled in two undergraduate courses – one core course specially designed for UVA Advance students and reserved for their enrollment and one elective course open to all Summer Session students. Students selected one of the following four core classes:


- AAS 2760: Empowered Women of Africa taught by Anne Rotich
- EVSC 2050: Introduction to Oceanography taught by Stephen Macko
- HIST 2559: Genocide taught by Jeffrey Rossman
- PLAP 2500: Campaign and Election Politics taught by Carah Ong Whaley

Students also chose a second course from “regular” 1000- or 2000-level Summer Session courses in which UVA Advance students were enrolled with resident (degree-seeking) UVA students.

UVA Advance received 160 completed applications for summer 2023. Fifty-eight students attended the program: 47 from Virginia, 10 from out-of-state, and 1 international. Of participating students, 26 were female and 32 male

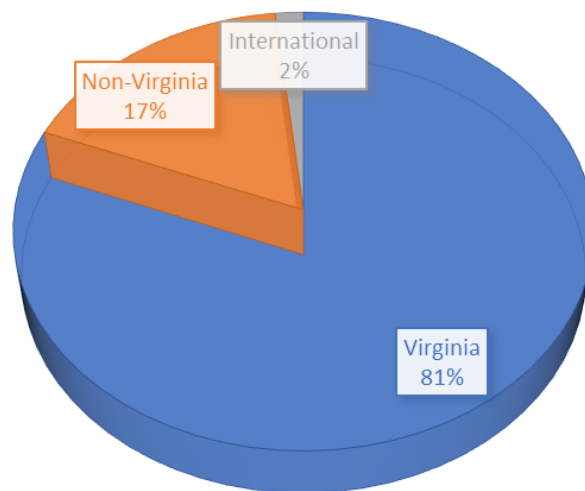
Eight accepted applicants also submitted applications for financial aid. Six students received need-based aid from UVA Advance in the form of full in-state tuition and fees.

## UVA ADVANCE STUDENT RESIDENCY



In addition to classes, a series of one-hour workshops prepared students for the challenges and opportunities that undergraduate students may encounter. Workshops on the following topics were required for all participants:

- Study Skills
- Library Research
- College Admissions
- CAPS
- Student Affairs and Student Safety
- Education Abroad

Students resided in Echols dormitory with residential staff — seven Resident Community Advisors and one graduate program director — who led team-building exercises, on-Grounds recreational events, and excursions to sights and destinations around Charlottesville. Residential staff participated in a day-long training session in advance of the program, in which they learned about community building, teenage cognitive development, and problem solving potential scenarios.

## Archaeological Field Schools



Summer & Special Academic Programs is pleased to sponsor summer archaeological field schools at three of Virginia's premier historic sites: the first permanent English settlement at Jamestown, Thomas Jefferson's primary home and plantation at Monticello, and Jefferson's personal retreat and plantation at Poplar Forest. These field schools offer a unique opportunity for students to make a contribution to the research and interpretation of early American history. Twenty-six students enrolled in these field schools, earning six graduate credits.

## MESDA Summer Institute

A partnership between the Museum of Early Southern Decorative Arts and Summer & Special Academic Programs enabled seven visiting graduate students to explore history and material culture at the 46<sup>th</sup> MESDA Summer Institute. The Institute this year emphasized The Lowcountry. A multidisciplinary approach included lectures and discussions as well as hands-on research with relevant artifacts and a study trip to Charleston, SC and St. Mary's, GA. Participants in MESDA Summer Institute earned three graduate credits.

## Morven Summer Institute

Thirty-five students participated in the 2023 Morven Summer Institute. Held at the University of Virginia's Morven Farm, the Institute allowed students to explore sustainability, design, food systems, and ecology through an interdisciplinary lens. The intensive, ten-day format of the MSI classes immerse students into their topics of focus.

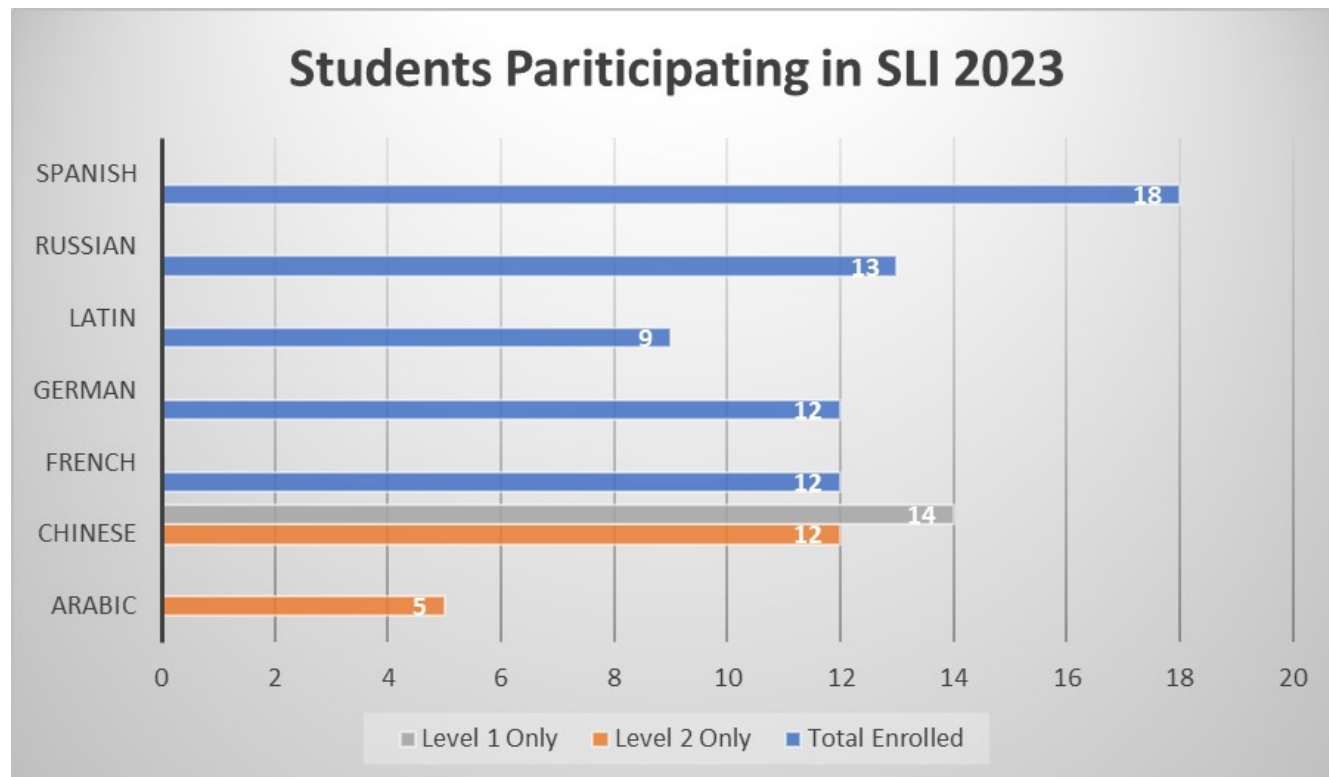


# Summer Language Institute

The 2023 Summer Language Institute offered eight-week courses in Arabic, Chinese, French, German, Latin, Russian, and Spanish. SLI students attended classes five days a week and up to seven and a half hours a day. Students developed listening, speaking, reading, and writing skills in a student-centered environment.

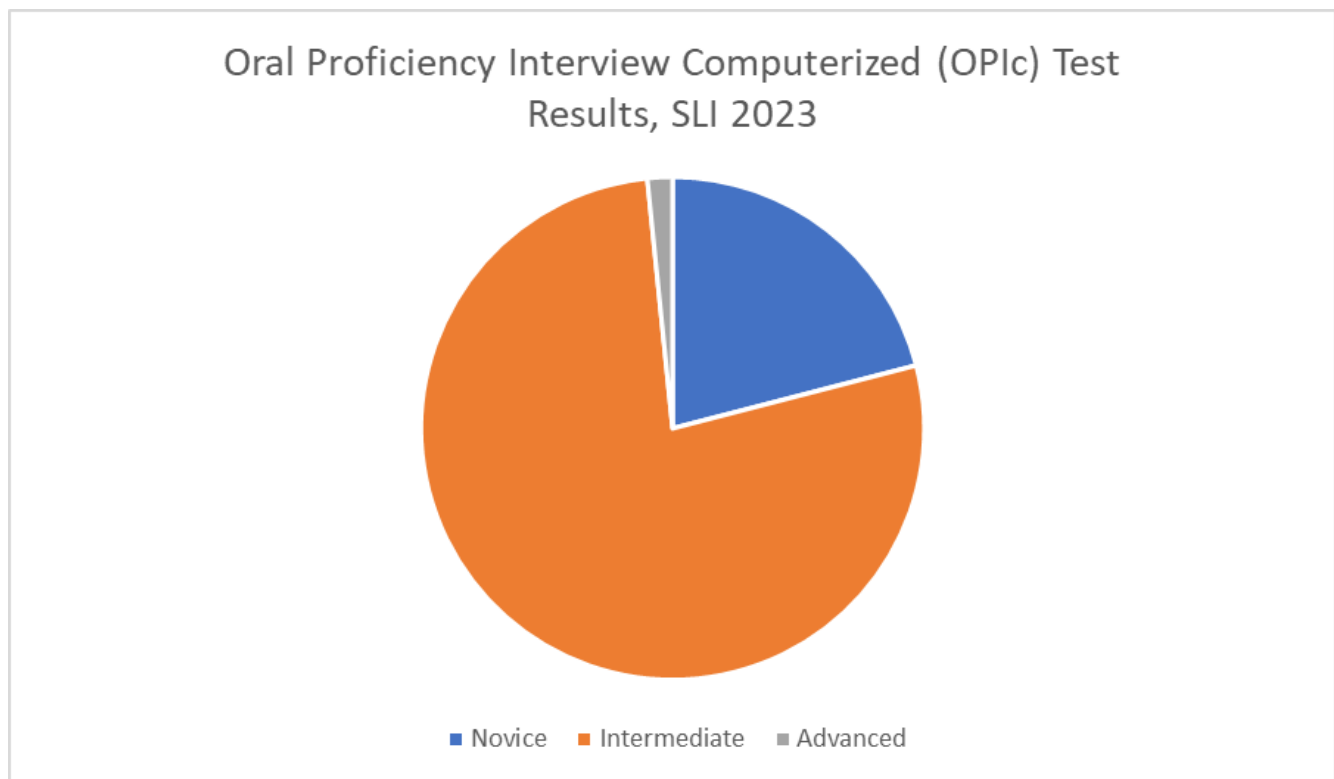
Participants earn 12 credits and cover the equivalent of two years of language study in the French, German, Latin, Russian, and Spanish programs. Students in these programs enter the SLI with no prior knowledge of the language and exit with intermediate-level proficiency, ready to take on the next challenge whether education or travel abroad, 3000-level college language courses, or graduate-level research. The Chinese and Arabic SLI programs yield eight credits in eight weeks and cover the equivalent of one year of college-level instruction. In addition to the eight credits of Modern Standard Arabic, the intermediate Arabic SLI includes an introduction to Levantine Colloquial (one additional credit) for a total of nine credits.

SLI received 145 completed applications for summer 2023. Ninety-six students enrolled, of whom 27 were visiting students.



More than 75% of SLI students scored intermediate level or higher on the Oral Proficiency Interview Computerized (OPIc) test in 2023.

Latin students took the Avant Reading test, with 100% scoring intermediate level or higher.



SLI students also participated in the following special events:

- Cooking classes at the International Center and professional cooking lessons in UVA's Teaching Kitchen
- International movie nights
- Snack Fest, a mid-point program celebration in which students from each language program share international snacks
- Picnic with students from other summer programs, including the Virginia-North Carolina Alliance Program, the Leadership Alliance Program, the Summer Research Internship Program, and the Summer Medical Leadership Program

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# Peace Corps Prep

UVA is one of only sixteen colleges in the state of Virginia to offer the Peace Corps Prep certificate program. The program prepares undergraduates for international development fieldwork and potential Peace Corps service through interrelated coursework, hands-on experience, and professional development support.

Participants select one of the following six work sectors, in which they complete at least three courses and 50 hours of related work or volunteer experience.

## PCP Work Sectors:

- Education
- Health
- Environment
- Agriculture
- Youth in Development
- Community Economic Development



In addition, program participants demonstrate foreign language skills and intercultural competence through their undergraduate coursework, as well as engaging in leadership experiences either on or off Grounds prior to graduation.

In 2023, the Peace Corps awarded three UVA graduates with the Peace Corps Prep certificate.

# CAELC

English as a Second Language (ESL) services at the University are offered through the Center for American English Language and Culture (CAELC). CAELC is charged both to provide leadership on issues related to ESL/intercultural communication and to help members of the University of Virginia community attain the level of linguistic and cultural proficiency needed for success at a research university in the United States. In fall 2022, CAELC offered 22 course sections and enrolled 284 students. In spring 2023, 23 course sections enrolled 164 students, and in summer 2023, 10 course sections enrolled 37 students. CAELC employed five full-time lecturers, one full-time program coordinator, one VISAS and assessment coordinator, several adjuncts and several student assistants for academic year 2022-23.

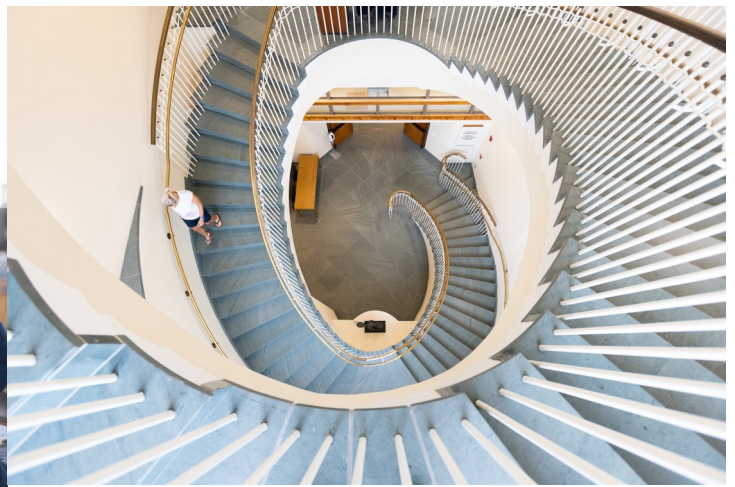
The Volunteers with International Students (VISAS) program boasted over 348 volunteers in fall 2022 and 291 in spring 2023. CAELC also administers the TESOL Certificate Program, a collaboration with the Linguistics Program, and provides tutors trained to work with non-native users of English in the Writing Center.
